The Litchfield Historical Society operates:

The Helga J. Ingraham Memorial Library

The Library is open year-round to researchers and houses information about Litchfield's 280 years of growth and change as reflected through the papers, publications, photographs, and ephemera of local residents, homes, businesses, institutions and organizations.

The Litchfield History Museum

exhibits the evolution of the town from its settlement in 1719 to today. Through changing exhibits, artifacts and archives, as well as hands-on areas, visitors can explore the diverse history of the town.

The Tapping Reeve House & Litchfield Law School

takes visitors on a journey through the 19th-century life of a real student who came to Litchfield for an education at the Litchfield Law School or the Litchfield Female Academy. The Litchfield Law School was America's first school of law. Through role-playing, handson areas, and interpretive exhibits, each visitor explores timeless issues of travel, communication, education, and community.

What is important about the Collections?

The Litchfield Historical Society's museum and library collections comprise the backbone of the institution.

Staff and volunteers generate all of the exhibits, research, publications, education and public programs, and special events from the Historical Society's collections. Today, the Historical Society collects items with historical value or meaning significant to the institutional mission, with an emphasis on the history of the town of Litchfield from its founding to the present. The collections document all areas of town: the center village, Bantam, Northfield, East Litchfield, and pre-1850s Morris. They enable us to make direct connections to the past to understand the present and future.

The majority of the museum and library collections were donated as gifts. We are an active collecting institution.

The organization occasionally purchases items from auctions, antique dealers, or private donors but the majority of the collections are given to the museum through the generous donations of local patrons. It is through this continued patronage that the collections are able to grow. By actively acquiring objects and papers from both Litchfield's past and present, the Historical Society maintains a diverse permanent collection for use in exhibits, educational and public programming, and research.

What's in the Collections?

Our collections support the Litchfield History Museum, The Tapping Reeve House & Litchfield Law School, and the Helga J. Ingraham Memorial Library.

 paintings, sculpture, prints, drawings, furniture, clocks, tools, equipment, textiles, costumes, personal accessories, ceramic, glass, and metal household items

Archives include:

 rare books of local significance, manuscripts of residents, organizational records of civic and religious groups, family genealogy

With staff and volunteers constantly working to input information into the collection databases, the majority of the permanent collections are publicly accessible, helping the Society become a resource for researchers, students, and museum professionals on an international level.

Consider an appraisal. The IRS considers donations over a certain value to not-for-profits a deductible action. If the item you are considering donating has a monetary value, you may want to consider having it appraised prior to donation. The Historical Society staff do not conduct appraisals for potential donors. It is the responsibility of the donor to contact an appraiser, set up the appointment, and pay for the service.

Arrange the delivery or pickup. The staff is happy to work with you to arrange either the delivery of the item by the door or have a staff member pick the item up.
